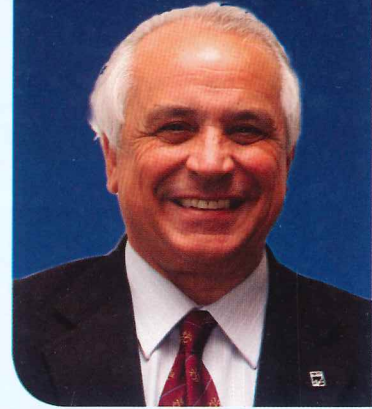

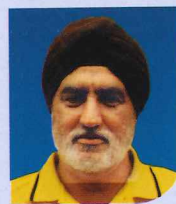

MALAYSIA'S 2013 JUNIOR WORLD CUP FINALS JOURNEY BEGAN WITH SULTAN OF JOHOR CUP IN 2011

Many may not realise that when Malaysia qualified for the Junior World Cup Finals in New Delhi in December last year the journey for Malaysia began with the Sultan of Johor Cup in 2011.

That was the year the Sultan of Johor Cup was inaugurated as an Invitational Under-21 international tournament limited to six teams. Those invited were Asian hockey rivals India and Pakistan, Australia, South Korea and New Zealand plus Malaysia as hosts completed the lineup.

It was the beginning of the journey for the Project 2013 squad under coach K. Dharmaraj with Mirnawan Nawawi as the team manager.

The *regu* (pair) worked wonders and along the way created Malaysian hockey history – when the national juniors became the first holders of the majestic silverware specially ordered from London.

The Malaysian juniors walked away with the title with a come-from-behind 3-2 win on golden goal over favourites Australia in a pulsating final in front of a packed stadium. The fanatical home fans were simply marvellous as they cheered the Malaysians to a great win and went 'wild' in celebrations.

For the record, it was Malaysia's first ever hockey title at any level

- either at home or abroad - and to write Malaysian hockey history would not have come at a better time and better place.

The Sultan of Johor Cup is the only annual junior tournament apart from the Junior World Cup which is held once every four years.

The International Hockey Federation (FIH) duly gave recognition to the Sultan of Johor Cup tournament not only by sanctioning it but also having it featured in the FIH annual calendar.

Months later the same Project 2013 team created history again – this time by winning the Junior Asia Cup in the historic city of Malacca. Winning the Asia Cup earned Malaysia a ticket to the Junior World Cup Finals in New Delhi in December last year – on merit.

In New Delhi the dream was on and the desire to win was burning in the juniors. The confidence was there. The Malaysian juniors had beaten teams like Germany, Australia, New Zealand, South Korea, India, Spain and Pakistan in matches as part their preparations for the world meet.

The Malaysian juniors were at a new height and countries were demanding Malaysia to play friendly matches against them to

the extent of providing free board and lodging.

In New Delhi, Malaysia got off to a dream start with a 2-1 win over New Zealand followed by a 2-1 win over South Africa and 4-2 over England to top their group with maximum nine points and an unbeaten record.

In the quarter-finals Malaysia edged South Korea 2-1 in an enthralling match to end a 31-year itch to qualify for the semi-finals.

Malaysia also made the semi-finals in 1979 in Versailles (France), 1982 in Kuala Lumpur and 1985 in Vancouver (Canada). In the semi-finals Malaysia took on France but could not match their European opponents when it came to the shootout after a 1-1 draw. The luck of the lottery went to the French who won 3-1, leaving the Malaysians heartbroken.

In the playoff for the bronze medal, Malaysia, demoralised by the defeat to France, were again at the receiving end and lost by a huge 7-2 margin to the Netherlands.

Germany remained the best team – winning the Junior World Cup for the sixth time by beating France 5-2 in the final. The Germans were also champions in Kuala Lumpur (1982), Vancouver (1985), Ipoh, Malaysia (1989), Terrassa, Spain (1993) and Johor Bahru, Malaysia (2009).

Iskandar Malaysia development has been attracting foreign investments to the state as Johor's economy takes an upswing.

This is reflected in Johor recording RM14.9 billion in industrial investments for the first five months of 2014. The statistics were issued by the Malaysian Investment Development Authority (Mida).

15 private specialist hospitals and Chief Minister Datuk Khaled Nordin revealed that the figure could increase to 20 within the next few years.

The State Economic Planning Unit (Upem) will soon launch an action plan and focus on six clusters to develop the healthcare sector – healthcare services, support services, caring for the aged, human capital development, manufacturing and research and development activities.

Johor is the biggest food manufacturer in the country and also had the biggest oil palm plantations in Peninsular Malaysia which makes the state to be in the forefront of global biotechnology production by focusing on agricultural, food and medical sectors.

Equipped with world-class facilities, a biotechnology hub



in Senai is expected to start operations in two years time – another feather in Iskandar Malaysia's cap.

Pengerang at the southern tip of east Johor is undergoing massive transformation under the government's Economic Transformation Programme which will transform the town into a modern and vibrant industrial town.

Pengerang Independent Terminals Sdn Bhd (PITSB), an oil and oil-based products storage facility operator – a joint venture between oil and gas services provider Dialog Group Bhd, Johor government and Royal Vopak – will soon challenge the global hubs as a storage provider.

The facility is equipped with six berths, including a deep water jetty which can accommodate very large crude carriers apart from storing oil and petroleum-based products.

Astaka Padu Sdn Bhd, a well known property developer is Johor is the second biggest contributor with RM200,000.

Johor Corporation (JCorp), the state government's investment arm, JBB Builder, UM Land, National Sports Council (NSC), Khazanah Nasional Bhd (UEM Land), Tenaga Nasional Berhad and Iskandar Waterfront Sdn Bhd pledged RM100,000 each.

Malaysia became the first holders of the Sultan of Johor Cup, beating Australia 3-2 in the final while Germany edged India 3-2 for the title in 2012. India, however, laid their hands on the impressive silverware by beating Malaysia 3-0 in last year's final.

The Kembara Mahkota began at Johor Bahru's the Dataran Bandaraya on June 21 and ended at Dataran Mahkota in Kota Iskandar, Nusajaya which is the administrative capital of Johor, on June 24.

This was followed by stops in Pekan Parit Jawa in Muar on Day 3 and on Day 4 the Royal convoy stopped in Rengit, Batu Pahat and Pekan Nenas in Pontian before making its way to Dataran Mahkota - its final destination.

Johor Bahru gets ready to host 2020 Malaysia Games (Sukma)

The Larkin Stadium, which has been turned into a football stadium, in the city of Johor Bahru will soon be a new landmark when it is upgraded as an integrated recreational area.

The upgrading works at a cost of an estimated RM1 billion will be carried out by JCorp, the state government's investment arm. The project will include building a new indoor stadium and upgrading the existing swimming pool.

JCorp president and chief executive officer Datuk Kamaruzzaman Abu Kassim revealed that the seating capacity at the Larkin Stadium will be increased from its present 40,000 to 50,000.

The design for the new indoor stadium will reflect the modern times and it will stand out as landmark of its own.

The project has been approved by the state government and Johor Land Bhd, a subsidiary of the JCorp, has been entrusted to

carry out the works.

The Larkin Stadium draws a capacity crowd each time Johor Darul Takzim play at the stadium in the M-League competition. The Johor flag bearer won the 2014 Malaysian Super League title.

The Larkin Stadium draws capacity crowd for Johor's home matches - thanks to the massive transformation football has undergone under Johor FA president HRH Brig Gen Tunku Ismail Sultan Ibrahim, the Crown Prince of Johor. Currently the Larkin Stadium pitch is the best football pitch in the country.

HRH Tunku Ismail is determined to make Johor a football powerhouse in this region.

The Larkin Stadium is the only stadium in the country with moving electronic bill boards.

With the state government wanting to turn Johor into a major international sports hub, Johor scored a first in the country when some 5,000 runners took part in

the EduCity Sundown Malaysia 2014 half-marathon – the first night marathon in the country.

The run was held in Nusajaya and attracted runners from United States, Australia, Singapore, India, Indonesia, the Philippines, Brunei, China, Iran, Greece and Malaysia.

Desaru, a popular holiday destination facing the South China Sea is the venue for the annual Asian Surfing Championships.

Johor tourism department director Dr Badrul Hisham Kassim said several more sporting events will be held in Desaru. One event that is a big hit is the Triathlon Desaru and more such events are in the pipeline.

Prince Abdullah is the New Asian Hockey Supremo

HRH Tengku Abdullah Sultan Ahmad Shah, the Crown Prince of Pahang, is the new Asian hockey supremo after he was returned unopposed as the new president of the Asian Hockey Federation (AHF) at the AHF elections held at Hotel Concord in Kuala Lumpur on August 31 2014.

The 55-year-old Prince Abdullah takes over the post following the demise of Sultan Azlan Shah, the Sultan of Perak, on May 28 this year due to illness. The late Sultan Azlan served as AHF president from 1990.

There were no other nominations for the president's post although there were initial reports that Pakistan were keen to put up a candidate.

Prince Abdullah, who is also the Football Association of Malaysia (FAM) president, was elected as the president of Malaysian Hockey Confederation in 2008 and currently sits as an elected member of the International Hockey Federation (FIH) Executive Board. HRH was elected to the board during its Congress in Kuala Lumpur in 2012.

The election of Prince Abdullah means the AHF headquarters will remain in Malaysia. For Prince Abdullah it is another feather in his cap as a sports administrator and widely recognised for his "hands-on" approach in governing sports bodies at all levels.

Prince Abdullah is also a much respected Polo player globally and is the President of the Royal

Malaysian Polo Association. Putting Prince Abdullah's elevation aside several other Malaysians were also returned unopposed for posts in the Asian hockey body. MHC Senior Vice-President Prof S. Shamala and Datuk Abdul Rahim Ariff are incumbent AHF council members.

The change in the AHF constitution saw the secretary-general's post abolished. Instead there will be a Chief Executive Officer to handle the job of secretary-general. Malaysia's Tan Sri P. Alagendra of Malaysia went down in history as the last AHF secretary-general.

Datuk Tayyab Ikram of Macau, a well known figure in the hockey world, was appointed as the first CEO of AHF.

In another development the new AHF constitution only allows those aged 70 years and below to stand for elections.

Prince Abdullah, in his first press conference after the elections said his first task is to raise the standard of hockey in Asia as Asian countries are lagging behind Europe and Australia.

PURAN - A double International as a Hockey Umpire and Rugby Referee

Sports loving teacher Puran Singh was one of the rare breed who excelled in rugby, hockey and cricket while studying at the St. Xavier's Institution in Penang.

The name Puran Singh rings a bell among the hockey and rugby fraternity especially. Not many know or are aware that Puran has a rugby silver medal from the 1967 SEAP Games (as the SEA Games were known then) in Bangkok. The Thais beat the Malaysians in the final.

That was the only time he donned national colours in an international meet but his love for the sports did not diminish. Instead, Puran was Malaysia's pride and kept the country's flag flying with honour and dignity when

he switched to umpiring hockey and refereeing rugby matches.

As a hockey umpire, Puran was Malaysia's pride when he officiated at the 1987 SEA Games in Jakarta. He was also a much sought after rugby referee in international tournaments and matches.

Among the highlights in his rugby career as a referee was officiating at the Asian Rugby Football Union Championships (ARFU) in Seoul, South Korea in 1976. Puran speaks with pride when talking of his career as an official in the two demanding sports.

As a 17-year-old in 1958, Puran represented Penang Sikhs in the Gurdwara Cup competition and when he joined the Teachers Training College in Penang to pursue a career in teaching. Puran began "making waves" on the national hockey and rugby fronts.

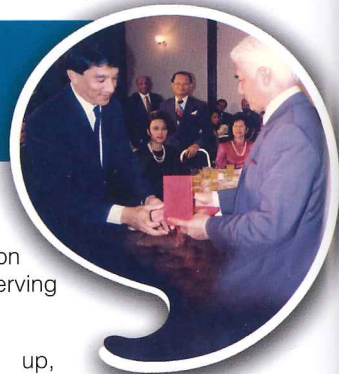
He represented Penang and later Johor in hockey and rugby. His exploits on the rugby pitch did not go unnoticed when he was selected to don national colours at the 1967 SEAP Games.

Puran later switched to coaching and excelled himself as a coach in the two sports he loved most - hockey and rugby. He also qualified as international hockey umpire, apart from being an international referee for rugby.

"I am proud that I was able to adjust myself officiating the two demanding sports," says the 73-year-old retiree and father of two, who now lives in Muar with his wife Kalwant Kaur and spends more time doing religious work.

Puran's son Dr. Harjeet Singh is an orthopaedic consultant at the Columbia Medical Centre in Bukit Rimau, Shah Alam, Selangor, while his daughter Karanjeet Kaur, is a consultant for an Australian company in Kuala Lumpur dealing in medical equipment.

MURUGAN NAIR - Found his Niche in Umpiring



He did not know how to hold a hockey stick when he was introduced to the game by his brother-in-law Stephen Ovinis who formed a team named Starlight in 1969.

That was the beginning of Murugan Nair's love affair with the 'stick and ball' game that has stuck to him until today. Dedication and hard work saw Starlight becoming giant killers in the Johor Bahru District hockey league.

Many Starlight players went on to become state and national players but Murugan, however, drew a passion to be an umpire - thanks to another teacher Ho Wah See, an international umpire who was among the best in the country at that time. Wah See guided and coached Murugan in umpiring.

Murugan, together with Starlight teammate S. Yasudhasan, sat for the theory examination in 1971 and got through with impressive results although the passing mark was a high 85%.

Murugan obtained his National Class 1

in 1981 at the age of 28 years - it was a long 10 years as the system was such that every umpire had to go through the process of "nurturing and maturing" by having to be at one grade for two or three years. It made one experienced and a better umpire.

And it was not until April 1989 that Murugan was accorded the status as an International Umpire. But "politics" in the national body left him bitter.

"While many of my colleagues who took up umpiring at the same time as me moved up the ladder to become International Grade 1, I was left behind basically due to favouritism and administrative bureaucracy," recalls Murugan who retired in February 2000 out of frustration after being left out and given international 'exposure' only in Malaysia.

However, Murugan was to begin his next chapter in hockey when he was appointed as the Johor Umpires Board chairman and his first priority was to ensure that what he went through "will

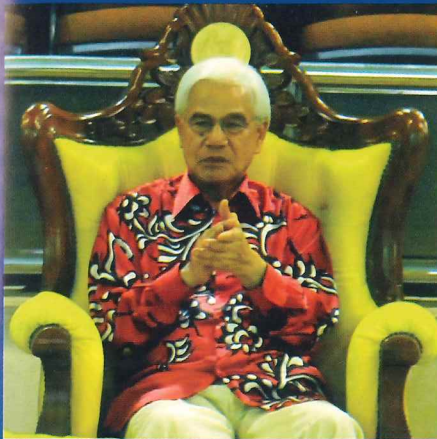
not befall on any deserving umpire".

Moving up, Murugan became a member of the Malaysian Hockey Confederation (MHC) Umpires Board in 2008 until today - ensuring that equality and fairness is practiced.

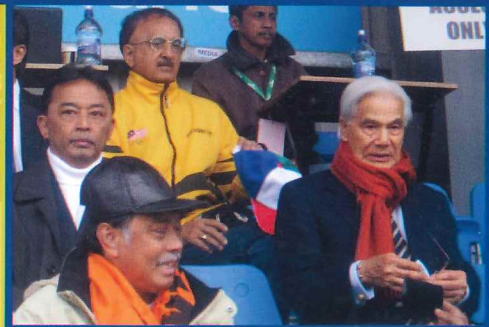
Today Murugan is also involved in technical duties and is one of the judges at the 4th Sultan of Johor Cup Under-21 Invitational tournament. To sum it up all, Murugan believes that having an umpiring background takes you a long way to being knowledgeable and a practical technical official.

He thanked Stephen Ovinis, a retired FIFA referee and currently a Football Association of Malaysia (FAM) Match Commissioner for introducing him to hockey and Ho Wah See for guiding and coaching in his umpiring career.

'FATHER OF ASIAN HOCKEY' SULTAN AZLAN SHAH'S DEMISE A BIG LOSS TO ASIAN HOCKEY



HRH Sultan Azlan Shah will be remembered for the many things he did for what was closest to him – HOCKEY – the sport he loved most.

To National Sports Council director general Datuk Seri Zolkples Embong the late Sultan Azlan Shah was a "humble man" whose vast contributions to hockey will be cherished by all.

Hockey was not the only sport to benefit from Sultan Azlan Shah's involvement in sports. He simply loved all sports.

Former Perak football coach Datuk M. Karathu described him as "a highly educated man with a strong passion for people who played a dynamic role in the development of sports in the country."

For hockey veteran C. Paramalingam, a former national hockey coach and manager, Sultan Azlan Shah was a "simply a great man" who came knocking on the room doors during international assignments and "sit on the bed like a friend."

Selangor hockey supremo Datuk Sri Subahan Kamal described the demise of Sultan Azlan Shah as loss not only to Malaysia but also Asia.

Johor Hockey Association deputy president Majid Manjit Abdullah, who is also a vice president of the Malaysian Hockey Confederation, said Sultan Azlan Shah's demise is felt by the entire hockey fraternity in the world.

Sultan Azlan Shah was Malaysia's ninth King (Yang di-Pertuan Agong) from 26th April 1989 to 25th April 1995.

The late Sultan Azlan Shah was born on April 19, 1928 in Batu Gajah and his early education began at the Government English School (which is now known as SMK Sultan Yusuf). He later studied at the famous and prestigious Malay College Kuala Kangsar, better known as MCKK.

HRH studied law at the University of Nottingham where he obtained a Bachelor in Law in 1953 and a year later was admitted to the English Bar in Lincoln's Inn.

He had a distinguished career in the legal service in Malaysia and at the age of 37 he was elevated to the Bench of the High Court of Malaya in 1965 and in the process became the youngest judge in the Commonwealth.

In 1982 Sultan Azlan became the youngest ever Lord President of the Federal Court, the country's highest judicial rank.

Sultan Azlan married Raja Permaisuri Perak Tuanku Bainum Mohd Ali in 1955 and the couple was blessed with two sons and three daughters. His eldest son Raja Dr Nazrin Shah is now the Sultan of Perak.

Hockey was in his blood and players close to his heart.

His demise on 28th May 2014 at the National Heart Institute in Kuala Lumpur left the hockey world shocked.

The hockey fraternity had nothing but praise for the man who played a key role in Malaysia's rise in the sport.

Who can forget Malaysia's fourth place finish in the 1975 World Cup in Kuala Lumpur – Malaysia's best ever finish in the event so far. Malaysia finished eighth in the Munich Olympics in 1972.

At this year's World Cup held in The Hague, a one minute silence was held in respect of the late Sultan Azlan Shah.

Former national captain Datuk N. Sri Shanmuganathan described Sultan Azlan Shah as a man of few words but a fatherly figure to players with words of encouragement.

GONE BUT NOT FORGOTTEN MAY THEIR SOULS REST IN PEACE

R. RATNASINGAM

(2nd November 1925 – 25th October 2003)

Thanks to late R. Ratnasingam's love for hockey, the history of Johor hockey is still alive.

Ratnasingam who retired as headmaster of Sekolah Tunku Mahmood (2) Kluang on 2nd November 1980 from a very satisfying teaching career, full of great achievements and good memories.

He was a sportsman extraordinaire, and represented Johor in hockey, cricket and athletics.

As a sports official Ratnasingam was an imposing figure in a red jacket with a starter's gun and he was aptly called the "Red Jacket Man with a pistol" & "Ratnasingam the starter."

In 1983, Ratnasingam was bestowed with "Tokoh Guru Negeri Johor" (Exemplary Teacher State Johor).

It was the retired headmaster's dedication in keeping hockey records in Johor that the Johor

Hockey Association was able to come out with a souvenir book on Johor Hockey's Golden Jubilee Anniversary in 2012.

He was in the team when Johor made their debut in Inter-State hockey on 13th November 1947 in Malacca and lost to Negri Sembilan 0-1. However, Johor bounced back to beat Malacca 1-0 in their second match a day later.

After giving up his playing career Ratnasingam, who hailed from Kluang, switched to official roles and served Johor Hockey Association in various capacities. He also achieved a fair amount of success as team manager.

He was the team manager when Johor had a big hand in Singapore's withdrawal from the 1966 Asian Games hockey tournament.

This came about after Johor, considered hockey minnows then, beat their neighbours from

across the causeway 2-1 in MHF South Zone Tun Razak hockey quadrangular match at the Town Padang in Kluang on 24th July 1966.

The defeat was a bitter pill to swallow for Singapore. Singapore's pride was dented and losing to Johor was too much of an embarrassment for the republic.

The Singapore Olympic Council and their Minister for Sports Encik Othman Wok felt that Singapore was not fit for international hockey if they were not able to beat minnows like Johor.

The defeat saw the beginning of Singapore's decline as a major force in inter-state and international hockey.

Ratnasingam was also the Johor team manager when Johor played India at the Jalan Besar Stadium in Singapore on 10th March, 1954. And the score read 11-0 in India's favour.



LEE CHENG SAN

(3rd January 1941 – 31st December 2011)

Lee Cheng San also hailed from the Batu Pahat district and taught at the Sekolah Dato Bentara Luar and Sekolah Menengah Kebangsaan Munshi Sulaiman.

His involvement in hockey began in the late 60s when he played for the district as well as coached the school team.

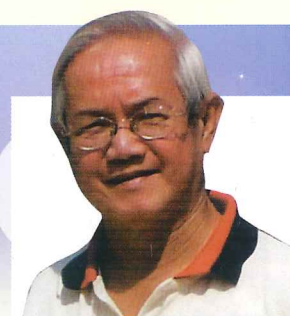
He joined the Johor Hockey Association and participated in hockey quizzes at state and

national level – at a time when Johor umpires were hockey quiz kingpins after the Johor Hockey Umpires Board was formed in 1961.

Cheng San began his umpiring career at district level before moving on to state and national level umpiring and became an international umpire in 1983. Among the international

tournaments Cheng San officiated were the Junior World Cup Hockey (Zone) and the South East Asia Games (SEA Games).

As an umpire Cheng San was well respected. Seldom did players complained about his decisions. He was always cool even during a tension filled match.

Johor hockey lost one of its most “dedicated and loyal” coaches with the passing of Indran R Nathan who died of complications after a bout of pneumonia while on holiday with his family in Pangkor Island, a popular holiday resort.

His death at the age of 73 left a big vacuum in Johor hockey, especially at schools level. The retired teacher was admitted to hospital in Sri Manjung, Lumut in Perak where he breathed his last. He was buried in his hometown Batu Pahat.

Indran, represented Johor as a player in various age group tournaments and the Razak Cup from the 1060s to 1970s before finding his niche in coaching. He was also involved in the 1975 World Cup in Kuala Lumpur as a facilitator.

Among the big names he groomed were former national hockey greats, Sarjit Singh, Yahya Atan, Lailin Abu Hassan,

Harbinder Singh, K. Ponnudurai and national juniors, including his son Anantha Kunan and Jasbinder Singh.

Johor Hockey Association deputy president Majid Manjit Abdullah described Indran as a “very dedicated and loyal coach” who could be found on the hockey field coaching schoolboys and schoolgirls almost every day and he would be on the field from 3pm to 7pm. He also helped coach his wife Pushpam Rajah’s school – Temenggong Ibrahim Girls School team and played a big role in Batu Pahat’s rise in the game.

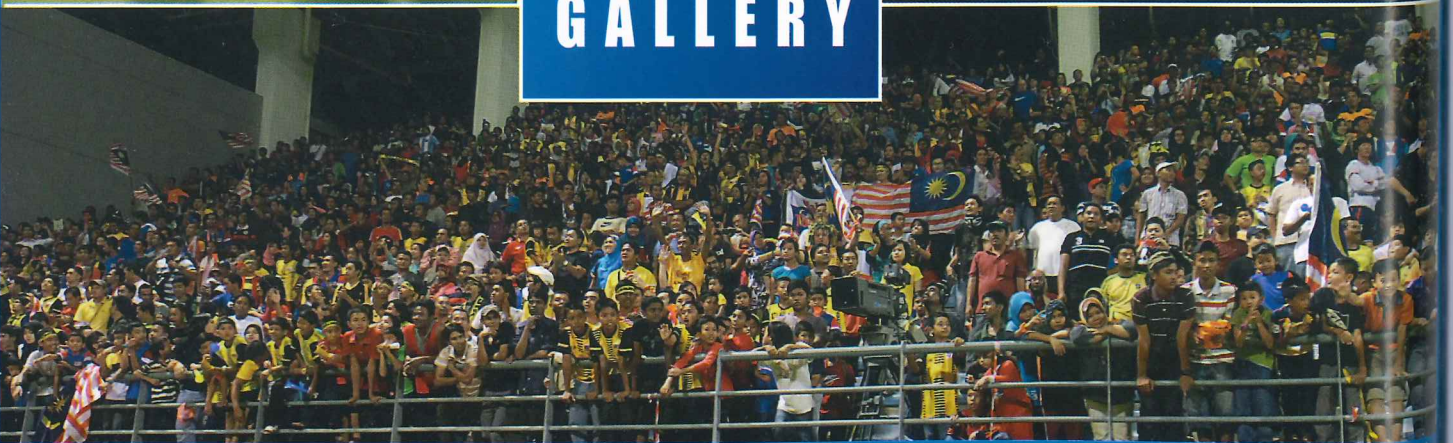
The Brinsford Lodge, England trained Indran taught at Sekolah Dato Bentara Luar, a premier school in Batu Pahat, for 27 years before he retired on 16th October 1992.

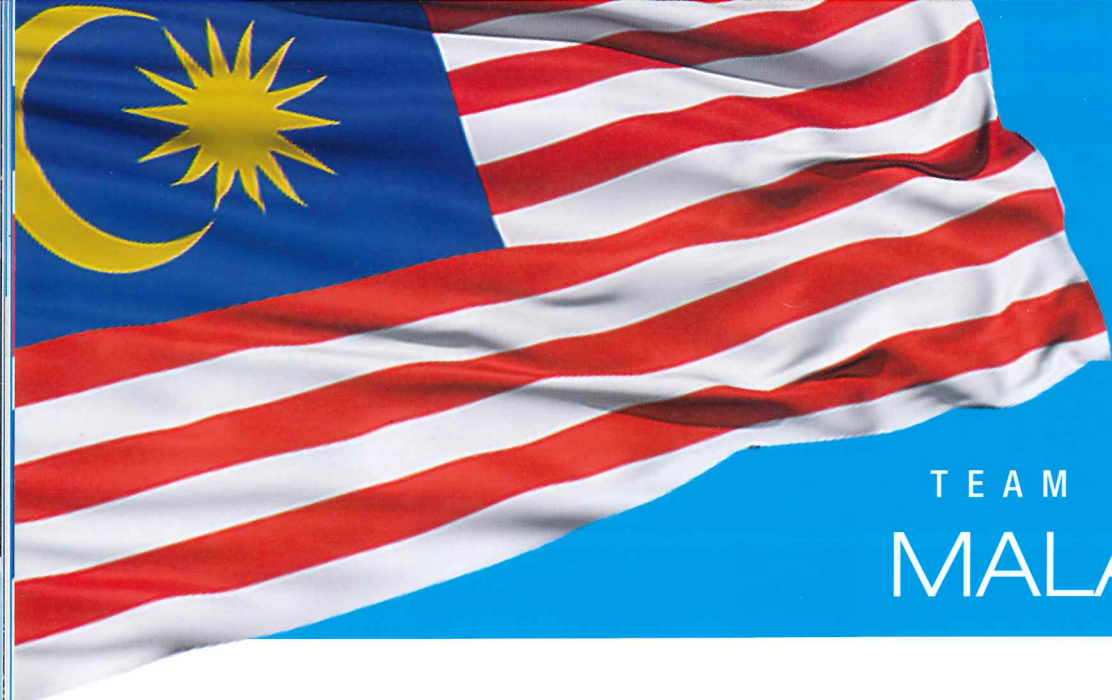

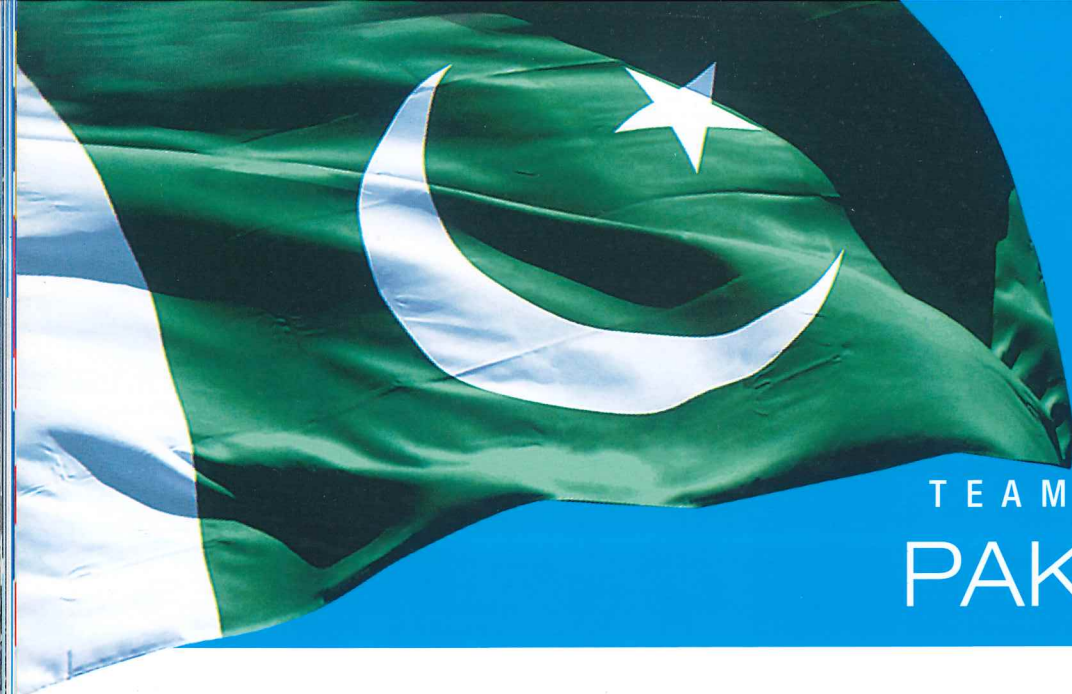
